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PUBLIC RECORDS – FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT (FOIA)

EXEMPT FROM DISCLOSURE:

- Trade Secrets
- Unreasonable invasion of personal privacy
- Gross receipts contained in applications for business licenses
- Name, address, phone number of a handicapped of disabled person for commercial solicitation.
- Audio recording of final statements of a dying victim in a 911 call (must be redacted prior to the release of the recordings unless privacy interest is waived by the victim's next of kin.)
- Records, video or audio recordings, or other info compiled for law enforcement purposes IF:
 - Would interfere with prospective law enforcement proceeding
 - > Would deprive a person of a right to a fair trial or an impartial adjudication
 - Unreasonable invasion of personal privacy
 - Would disclose a confidential source
 - Would disclose current law enforcement techniques & procedures
 - > Would endanger the life or physical safety of any individual
 - ➤ Would disclose any content of intercepted wire, oral or electronic communications not otherwise disclosed during a trial
 - Matters specifically exempted from disclosure by statute or law
 - Contract for sale of real estate, until deed is executed
 - > Confidential proprietary for economic development or contract negotiations
 - Compensation paid by public bodies
 - Correspondence or work products of legal counsel
 - Employment materials redact income tax returns, medical records, SSN
 - State institutions of higher education; staff, employees, students
 - Identity of individual who made a good faith complaint alleging a violation or potential violation
 - Structural bridge plans
 - Photographs, videos, visual images and audio recordings of and related to the performance of an autopsy
 - Private investment financial data
 - Privileged communication or protected identity
 - Adoption records
 - > Date of birth
 - Hospital records
 - ➤ Address
 - Witness information
 - ➤ Expungement Records Under Seal 17-1-40; Must remove name if 1 charge from incident report; if more than 1 charge, must remove the charge but leave the name.
